



# Didactics

The mission of MFMR didactics is to provide an intensive but comprehensive review of Family Medicine medical knowledge in preparation for in-training and board exams over a 12-month academic calendar.

**Methods:** Formal teaching takes place on Wednesdays. We split our didactics into a morning academics and afternoon didactics. Morning academics typically consists of smaller groups for procedures, simulation, case-based review, chart stimulated recall, and special topic discussions.

Afternoon didactics consist of larger groups for core faculty presentations, flipped classroom, and special guest lectures. These lectures are evidence-based around the dominant national guidelines and board content listed below.

Additionally, residents participate in occasional weekly meetings including psychiatry consults, osteopathic journal club, prenatal review, and wilderness medicine.

**Expectations:** Residency didactics are analogous to an independent physician's continuing medical education. As such, we expect residents to treat with respect the time dedicated by faculty and guest lectures. Expected attendance for residents is 90%; and residents are required to notify the assigned faculty and scheduler if unable to attend last-minute.

## American Board of Family Medicine Board Content

- **Acute Care and Diagnosis (35%):** ambulatory clinic practice and diagnosis and initial treatment.
- **Chronic Care Management (25%):** ambulatory clinic practice or other long term-care settings with ongoing management of a chronic disease.
- **Emergent and Urgent Care (20%):** hospital settings, emergency department settings, urgent care settings or ambulatory practice settings and patient management decisions needed in a matter of hours.
- **Preventive Care (15%):** Any issue encountered in the ambulatory clinic setting where preventive care services are being provided.
- **Foundations of Care (5%):** Topics important in the provision of care, including statistics, health policy, legal issues, health equity, etc.
