

**Kratom:** A tropical tree native to Southeast Asia. Products are derived from the tree's leaves. Products made from the tree's leaves contain intoxicating chemicals.

### How is it used?

- Traditionally used as a multi-purpose remedy to increase alertness and energy.
- Most people report using kratom to self-medicate pain, opioid withdrawal or opioid use disorder, anxiety, or depression, rather than for recreational purposes.

# **Kratom Health Impacts**

Kratom produces stimulant like effects in small doses.

Produces opioid or sedative effects in larger doses.

Potentially addictive.







- Adverse effects include nausea, constipation, dizziness and drowsiness. It can also cause confusion, tremors, seizures, high blood pressure and vomiting.
- Mild to moderate withdrawal symptoms when stopping regular kratom use. There are known overdoses and death related to kratom use.
- Information on health effects is limited; consumers can't make informed decisions.

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## **Kratom Regulation and Classification**

DEA lists kratom as a "drug of concern."



Kratom is illegal in 6 states, and some municipalities in the U.S. Kratom unregulated in Montana.



There is no FDA approval of kratom as a prescription drug, food additive or dietary supplement

# What is a kava bar?

- Marketed as sober night-life, alcohol-alternative, booze-free buzz.
- Promoted for health and wellness.
- Kava bars often sell kratom under the guise of "botanical tea".
- "Kratom is not lawfully marketed in the U.S as a drug product, dietary supplement or a food additive in conventional food." FDA 2024
- In 2023, there were more than 280 Kava bars in the U.S. and three in Yellowstone County.
- The number of Kava bars in the US increased 30% from 2012-2017.
