MEASLES:

It's more than "just a rash"

Measles is highly contagious and can be especially dangerous for babies and young children.

Hundreds of people have been sickened with measles across the U.S. this year.

3 people have died.

About 75% are under age 19 Nearly all are unvaccinated or have unknown vaccination status



As of April 18, 2025, there are several reported cases of measles in Montana.

WHAT YOU CAN DO:



Get vaccinated according to CDC's recommended immunization schedule.

One measles vaccine dose (MMR) is 93% effective in preventing infection, and a second dose increases the effectiveness to 97%. Protection may start as early as 2 weeks.

Talk to your healthcare provider if you are traveling to an area of the U.S. experiencing an outbreak or internationally.



If you are sick and think you may have been exposed to measles,

call your provider before going to a clinic or ER.

WHEN TO VACCINATE:

Children should get a 2-dose series at age 12 months and age 4 years.

Unvaccinated adults should get one dose.

Children over 1 year old who miss one or both recommended MMR vaccines can be vaccinated. Talk to your provider about dosing recommendations.
